Classroom Instructional Design

Dear PEC Families,

Spring has sprung! Our program planning for the 2022-2023 school year is already well underway. The Primary Education Center Staff believe that parental involvement in a child's educational program is an essential cornerstone for a successful school year. We also recognize that each child has a unique learning style. To nurture your child's strengths, we will continue to create a dynamic instructional design at each grade level. The following education programs <u>may</u> be implemented at the Primary Education Center next school year:

<u>Traditional Elementary Classroom</u>: Students remain with the same academic teacher for the entire instructional day.

<u>Departmentalizing Model</u>: Students transition to another class for one subject. Teacher specialize in a curriculum area like math and writing.

<u>Co-Teaching Model</u>: Students are in one classroom and are instructed by two teachers for part of the day.

<u>Looping</u>: This is an educational design or structure in which a whole class stays together for two consecutive years with the same teacher.

*Combined Looping and Departmentalizing is also sometimes an option.

<u>Multiage Model</u>: This Educational design is composed of students of mixed ages. Most of the children spend two to three years with the same home-based teacher. This model incorporates the concept of looping, departmentalizing, and peer mentoring.

Although we can not always honor teacher requests, we are interested in placing your child in a classroom design that meets his/her needs. Thank you.

Our Diversity/Habit book of the month is What is Given from the Heart by Patricia C. McKissack. It focuses on Habit 4: Think Win-Win.





Math Doesn't Take a Vacation

Are you looking for some ideas to keep math on the mind of your child during spring recess?


Well, this month I would like to offer a list of suggestions of things you and your child can do while traveling:


- Keep track of how many miles you drive or fly. For younger children, group miles by 5's or 10's.
 For older <u>students</u> group by 50's or 100's. This is great skip counting and place value practice.
 Take it to the next level by organizing or graphing the data in some way.
- Talk to your child and help them determine how much tip to leave when dining out.
- · Count the charge if you pay cash for anything while traveling.
- A new twist on the license plate game give any letters on the license plates a number value, then
 have your child add all the numbers together. If more than one child is playing, compare the
 values to see who spotted a license plate with a greater value.
- Count and sort cars by color or type while on a road trip. They can make a chart and use tally
 marks. What did they see most while traveling? You can do this with luggage at an airport too!
- Magic number of the day to start each day select a magic number and then look for it! Look on signs, merus, and license plates, for example. Build more interest by adding in a small prize for the person who spots it the most!
- Talk about time. This is a great opportunity to help children understand units of time and begin
 to measure or at least estimate how long units of time are. This is likely more instruction on your
 part, but building that awareness can be helpful. We already know the first question..."How much
 longer till we get there?"
